CREC's Local School Wellness Policy (LSWP) has recently undergone a required Triennial Assessment to:

District compliance with the LSWP was assessed using the CSDE/Rudd Center template WellSAT 2.0, which rates each section of the LSWP against the actual district practices in place. The following are identified areas of success in meeting the goals stated in the CREC LSWP:

#### School Meal Standards

- All parts of the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act regulations are currently being fully implemented
- All CREC schools offer breakfast
- Confidentiality of free/reduced eligible students is ensured via electronic meal counting systems

#### Nutrition Standards for Competitive and Other Foods and Beverages

 All CREC schools are part of the CSDE Healthy Food Certification program, which exceeds the USDA Smart Snack regulations

#### Wellness Promotion and Marketing

- Teachers are encouraged to use physical activity as a reward for students
- Teachers do NOT use physical activity as a punishment
- There is NO food or beverage marketing on school signs, scoreboards, screen savers, school TV or radio stations, or in the serving and dining areas
